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Stout chair of Murray State Board of Regents

Marion attorney Alan Stout has long-standing ties to Murray State University. Now, he has been elected chairman of the Murray State Board of Regents. Stout, who is in the third

of a six-year term on the board, has pledged that university business will be more open now that he is chairman. He says public universities should be accessible and accommodating to various thoughts and opinions.

Stout was elected to the chairmanship Friday. A chairperson is chosen annually by regents during officer elections. Faculty Regent Jay Morgan was elected vice chairman. Morgan is an associate professor of agriculture.

Stout replaces Marilyn Buchanon of Grand Rivers as the governing body for the university. He was elected after receiving six votes from the

members present at the meeting. "It was the first time in at

least 20 years

that any of the

incumbent officers have been challenged,"

Buchanon told the Paducah Sun after the vote. However, she said she will work with Stout and Morgan to ensure a smooth transition in leader-

"It's been said that the changing of an administration at a university is like turning a page," said Stout, who was appointed to the board by Gov.

Stout said he invites open discussion among board members. He also said new Murray State President Randy Dunn can count on his "complete and total support" and that the board wants to "carry out Dunn's vision to take us to the next level.'

Stout's priorities include continuing academic excellence, embracing partnerships with satellite campuses and the community colleges, and increasing accessibility for potential students.

Stout's roots at Murray State run deep. He is a 1978 graduate of the university with a degree in radio and television. His brother, Keith, is a Murray State alumnus and so is his step-daughter Erica Guess and brother-in-law Dr.

Steve Crider and his wife Debbie. Stout's daughter, Katie Cunningham, is currently attending MSU and his son, Logan, who graduates from Crittenden County High this week, will be heading to Murray in the fall.

Two years ago, Stout became very active in Murray State's administrative level when he served as president of the alumni association.

Despite keeping a very busy schedule with his law practice, which has offices in Marion

and Paducah, and his family, Stout says he's always found time to give something back to his university. He said that modern technology has made it much easier to serve as a regent.

"We can handle a great deal through e-mail and conference calls," he said, pointing out that his home is about 70 miles from campus.

Stout is the fifth Crittenden Countian to serve on the Board of Regents, and the first to chair the board. Others were Hollis Franklin, the late president of Farmers Bank; Bill Westberry, the late attorney who practiced in Marion; Louis Litchfield, the late school superintendent here; and Don Thomas, a Benton attorney who was student regent in the mid-1980s.

Graduation special for cancer survivor

She probably won't be at all happy to see her face and name on the front of this newspaper, but Kelsey Thompson has been an inspiration to those who have followed her struggle with cancer.

This week, she takes another big step in her life. Thompson graduates this Friday, walking across the stage to receive a diploma like all of her fellow Crittenden County High School seniors.

The 18-year-old shies away from the spotlight and seems quite uncomfortable talking about the nine-year fight with her disease. But it was not always certain she would be around to wear a cap and gown, her mom Kathy said Monday morning while watching seniors in Rocket Arena mingle after practicing

for their big night. "Kelsey's my baby," the mother of two previous graduates said. "That's why this has been so tough."

The youngest of Kathy and Larry Thompson's three children, Kelsey was diagnosed with leukemia at the age of nine.

Half of her life has been consumed by cancer, and maybe that's why she is so looking forward to getting away to Murray State University next fall. Her mom says she may finally be able to be Kelsey Thompson at Murray – just another teenager living on her own for the

first time, struggling to get up for early classes and eating lots of pizza

and junk food. "I think she's ready to start anew," Kathy said, sitting next to her daughter's bone marrow donor who flew in from Pennsylvania for graduation this week.

"It's nice to see her all grown up," Beth Hawthorne said.

Hawthorne first met the little girl to whom she gave another shot at life atop the Empire State Building

in New York. It was a little more than a year after Kelsey's March 2000 bone marrow transplant Vanderbilt Hospital Nashville. Since that time, the 44-year-old mother of two has watched Kelsey and her friends grow up. In fact, she has become what she

calls a second mom to Kelsey. "Had I not done it, she might not be here," the donor said of her painful operation to remove the bone marrow from her pelvic area.

You might understand why she feels that way when you consider Kelsey has spent more than 200 days in the hospital, had countless days of sickness and pain, lost her hair twice to intense chemotherapy and radiation and missed half of two school years and all of the sixth

"She was worried about her hair. We were worried if she was going to live," Kathy said, with tears starting to well in the corners of her eyes.

Kelsey never fell behind in school, despite missing almost two years of class time. She never wanted to leave her friends like Sam Peek and Kelsey Simpson whom she will graduate with on Friday.

Though she's anxious to leave behind "the drama" she lives with every day in the community that has embraced and backed her, Kelsey has accepted her disease. This summer, she will be a counselor-in-training at Camp Horizon, a camp near Nashville for children with cancer. Her mom says the teen wants to study to be a child-life specialist, helping kids and families cope with serious illnesses.

But more important than preparing for a career and independence that could one day bring about marriage and a family, Hawthorne said Kelsey's time away will give her something even more precious.

"She'll become Thompson."

Remembering the horrors of World War II

Memorial approaches, let us not forget our fallen heroes and heroines who gave their lives for our country.

From the archives of The Crittenden Press, we learn about Crittenden County's World War II heroes.

June 11, 1943

A son's letter to his mother reads: Mrs. L.C. Truitt, Repton, Ky.

Dearest mother and all:

How is evervone doing? Fine hope Suppose you all are awfully busy with the work. I OK am and feel

fine. How does the news sound to you from over here?

The boys in Africa cleaned house didn't they? I think things will progress pretty good from now on, of course it isn't over yet.

The people in the states don't know or realize what hardships are. It would do them good to get a taste of combat, then they would appreciate what they do have. Gets pretty rough and rugged for us all sometimes but we like it. Hope to have another letter.

From your son, Staff Sgt. Joe Truitt (somewhere in England)

Just two months later, the Truitt family has another let-

Aug. 13, 1943.

Sgt. Joseph H. Truitt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lacy Truitt, Bombardier stationed in England and operating in European Territory, was reported missing in action, according to word received by his parents. The message from Adj. Gen. Ulio placed

the date as July 29th.

Sgt. Truitt has been stationed in England for the past several months and was a member of a bomber squadron operating in the European theatre. He is a veteran of many combat aircraft missions and gained national prominence several weeks ago by reporting to the British airdrome the shortest report of military activities on

Collins was the first Crittenden County service man to lose his life in World War II, having been among the casualties suffered by the United States forces at the treacherous and disastrous Japanese attack upon the Pearl Harbor Naval Base in the Hawaiian Islands on Dec.

7, 1941. He was a member of the United States Navy.

Nov. 7, 1947

In solemn and impressive ceremony, the remains of Thomas W. Collins, the first Crittenden County serviceman to lose his life while in service during the last great war, were laid to rest in the cemetery at the Rock Springs Church in Webster County.

Thomas W. Collins as born Aug. 8, 1921, and enlisted at Louisville in the United States Navy, on Nov. 8, 1939, as Apprentice Seaman.

He was sent to the Great Lakes Naval Training Station for seamanship instruction, and later transferred to the USS Downs. He was stationed at the U.S. Naval Base at Pearl Harbor in the Hawaiian Islands, and was listed as Fireman 3rd Class, while attached to the Downs, a destroyer ship.

He was killed on Dec. 7, 1941, in the Japanese attack on the Hawaiian base.

Collins is survived by his mother, Mrs. Sarah J. Collins; two brothers, Marvin and Eugene, and a sister,

The body of Collins arrived in the United States a few weeks ago, and was received in Marion last Friday afternoon and was accompanied by Chief Petty Officer William C. Herndon. The body was taken to the home of his brother until Sunday afternoon when the funeral cortege left for the cemetery.

The funeral cortege was escorted from Marion by the City of Marion police car, and a State Highway Patrol car. A large crowd attended the funeral rites at the church, with a large delegation present from Crittenden County.

Military rites were conducted at the funeral with Lt. Col. Calvert Small of Marion in charge of the military ser-

At the graveside, the final salute to the dead was given

by a squad of men of Ellis B. Ordway Post 111 of the American Legion, firing three volleys over the grave. The flag which had covered the casket, was folded and presented to Mrs. Collins, the mother, and Taps sounded out the final farewell in tribute to the first war dead returned to Crittenden County from overseas.

Nov. 14, 1947

Military funeral rites for the second returned serviceman's remains were held Wednesday afternoon, when the body of James Carl Yandell was laid to rest in Union Cemetery.

The body was received in the county on Tuesday and funeral services were under the direction of Ellis B. Ordway Post 111 of American Legion. James C. Yandell was killed Oct. 18, 1944 in Belgium. He was the son of George W. and Nancy C. Yandell. -----

Nov. 12, 1948

Private Harvey Paris, son of Harvey and Emma Paris, was born at Ridgeway, Ill., on Aug. 9, 1925, and departed this life in action on Aug. 5, 1944, near Vire, France, at the age of 18 years, 11 months and 26 days.

Private Paris was inducted in the U.S. Army December,

1943, and was a member of Co. I, 116 Infantry. He received military training at Camp Croft, S.C., and was sent overseas in June of 1944.

At the time called in service, he was a senior at Marion High School. At the age of 13, he moved to Kentucky with his parents.

He leaves his parents, relatives and a host of friends. Funeral services were conducted at the Cumberland Presbyterian Church with military rites at the graveside at Mapleview Cemetery.

Harvey's great hope was that the war would soon be over and he would be home soon. Gone but not forgotten. These words from his parents, Harvey and Emma Paris, in memory of their son.

Let us join in salute with those, who in years gone by, have given of their best freely, that all which our flag represents might be kept true and secure.



ROCKET BASEBALL Crittenden earns berth in 2nd Region tourney

Possibly for the first time in school history, the Rockets defeated archrival Livingston Central for the third time in the same season Tuesday at Smithland. Crittenden fought back from a five-run deficit after the fifth inning to claim an exhilarating 8-7 victory in the opening round of the Fifth District Tournament.

Despite falling to Trigg County 11-1 in the championship game later Tuesday evening, the Rockets ensured a berth in next week's Second Region Tournament at Christian County. The tournament pairings will be set Saturday.

It will mark Crittenden's first appearance in the Second Region Tournament since the 2000 season. Come-from-behind berth

In the semifinal matchup, Crittenden leadoff hitter Jacob McMican reached via a hitsbatsman to start the game. One out and a stolen base later, he came around to score thanks to an RBI-double

by Cody McDonald. After J.D. Gray stole second base in the second inning, he came around to score on an errant throw.

The Cardinals still trailing 2-0 in the top of the fourth, got things going with two outs and nobody on base when Cardinal hurler Ethan Travelstead reached on a double. He was 3-for-4 on the day. One batter later, designated hitter Sonny Evans recorded an RBI-double.

McMican, who had fanned six while allowing just four hits through four innings, began to struggle in the fifth inning. After issuing a walk, hitting a batter and surrendering an RBI-double to Josh Wiggins, Rocket coach Denis Hodge lifted him in favor of McDonald, who has been the team's best reliever.

However, the Cardinals continued to stroke the ball as a total of six straight hitters reached base thanks to five hits and an error. Soon, Livingston led 7-2 and Alex Wood was called on to pitch with one out. He got the next two batters to keep the game within reach.

The Rocket offense was far from done. McDonald, who finished 2-for-3 in the game, led off the sixth a double. Joey Pluskota followed with a single off of Travelstead and Dylan Clark got his squad's third consecutive hit of the inning, scoring McDonald.

One out later, Gray cut the deficit to 7-4, scoring Pluskota with another RBI-single.


Still trailing 7-4 in the bottom of the seventh, the Rockets put their first three batters on base with no outs for the second consecutive inning.

McMican, who reached base in all four plate appearances in the semifinal win, led off with a double to right field.

Livingston Central skipper Mike Riley lifted Travelstead and put Andy Neal on the mound. However, Neal walked Alex Porter, and McDonald reached on an error. McMican scored on an errant throw, cuttling the lead to 7-5. Porter also came in to score on a Cardinal miscue making it 7-6 with no outs.

After Neal recovered to retire the next two Crittenden batters, it appeared as if he might be able to nail down the win and end the Rockets' season. However, Wood smacked a game-tying RBI-single to score McDonald.

With their five-run lead gone, the Cards needed one more out to force extra innings. However, after Wood stole second base, then scored on an error.
