

Board hires Yarbrough

New schools superintendent from neighboring Webster

By DARYL K. TABOR

Dr. Rachel Yarbrough believes the pieces are in place to make Crittenden County schools some of the best in the state. Starting July 1, she will begin putting that theory to the test.

Yarbrough's hire as superintendent of the school district was made official Tuesday during the Crittenden County Board of Education's regular monthly meeting. She was introduced by board Chairman Chris Cook to thunderous applause from teachers, administrators and parents gathered to hear who would be filling John Belt's role as the chief educator in the school district.

Like Superintendent Belt, who

announced in February his intentions to retire, Yarbrough began her career

as a teacher and moved through the ranks as a principal and central office employee. Unlike Belt, a Crittenden County native. Yarbrough comes from Webster County, where she graduated high school and has spent her entire 19-year career as an educator.

She has served the last nine years as assistant superintendent there, helping to oversee some major changes and improvements in the district.

Saluting sacrifice



"I feel like we are getting ready for a renaissance in Crittenden County schools," Cook said after the board unanimously selected Yarbrough over three other finalists for the position. "Our best days are ahead of us. The 40-year-old former basketball

star at Webster County and Oakland City (Ind.) College will take over what Cook called a solid foundation laid by Belt in his three years as superintendent. On that foundation, however, rests a small, rural district in the midst of an almost-annual budget crisis.

Rising fuel and utility costs, coupled with increased state mandates and shrinking reimbursements based on declining enrollment forced the district to make more than \$300,000 in cuts last year, including staff positions. Belt, in the midst of preparing his final

First, the new tradition at Blackford, which includes the Veterans Walk of Honor, will pay special tribute beginning at 2 p.m., Saturday to Andrew Jackson Smith, a runaway slave awarded Congressional Medal of Honor for his bravery as a federal sol-

Danny Witherspoon, who labored for years to create the Blackford memorial, chose Smith, a black man, to honor the bravery of all Americans who have served the flag, no matter their color. And, Smith has local ties as well.

He was born in Livingston County, two decades before the war began in 1861, though the

City moves forward with tax rollback, budget By DARYL K. TABOR There are 23 full-time workers and

The City of Marion plans to move ahead with approval of a \$2.5 million budget that includes a tax break and an almost five-percent raise for city

A tax reduction would not technically come until September when council members will vote on new property tax rates for 2008, but City Administrator Mark Bryant's 2008-09 budget reflects revenues from a 10percent cut in the levy on real estate. The reduction, if approved at a 4 p.m., budget hearing on Friday, would result in about \$20,000 less income for the

coming fiscal year. The new tax rate would be set in the fall at 21.8 cents per \$100 of assessed value if the council agrees to the budget and sticks with the revenue plan. Revenue loss would not affect city ser-

vices, nor would it create any type of crisis for the municipality, Bryant said. In fact, the city maintains about \$3 million in reserve.

He said the council has not increased property taxes since 1992 and three-percent for part-timers.

If approved, Bryant would remain the city's highest-paid employee at \$57,514 followed by the utilities director at \$48,693. The chief of police would earn \$36,742. The department's other full-time police officers would take home \$32,745 to \$33,205. The lowest-paid full-time positions inside city government take home \$18,836. Benefits for full-time employees include 100 percent of health insurance costs for the employee.

Councilman Jason Hatfield also wants to explore doubling the per-run pay for city firefighters. Marion firefighters are paid per response and would receive only \$19.38 per run under the proposed budget. City

An ensuing search of the property uncovered an active meth lab, six marijuana plants, processed marijuana, growing lights, growing trays and other items of drug paraphernalia.

Two suspects were subsequently arrested without incident and lodged in Crittenden County Detention Center. Beverlie Belt, 33, was charged with manufacturing methamphetamine; firstdegree possession of a controlled substance (meth) and second-offense possession of drug paraphernalia. Carl Belt Jr., 35, was charged with possession of drug paraphernalia, cultivating marijuana more than five plants and possession of marijuana.

Trooper Darron Holliman was the investigating officer. state police's Drug Enforcement/Special Investigations West section dismantled and performed the clean up of the alleged

According to the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency's National Clandestine Laboratory Register for Kentucky, the last active meth lab seized in Crittenden County was in April 2004 on Long Branch Road.

schools have faced similar financial difficulties to those of Crittenden County, but have addressed them in part by becoming the first district in Kentucky to implement a four-day school week. Since that change, with Yarbrough implementing many of the adjustments as assistant superintendent, the district has faced a decreased financial burden and has vaulted from 115th of Kentucky's 176 school districts to 53rd in student achievement.

But she comes to Marion with no preconceived notions that the four-day calendar is the answer for Crittenden County. Under the district's last two superintendents -Belt and Fredericka Hargis the adjusted calendar has been explored by the board of education, only to unscover lackluster support and less-

than-expected savings. Yarbrough shows no interest in revisiting the issue, at least not anytime soon.

"Every school district is different," she said. "I don't come to Crittenden County with any expectations that is what will work here."

Yarbrough said the success in Webster County has been due not so much to the new calendar as to the extra time made available for teacher collaboration.

"That is really what ensured its success," she said of the four-day calendar, adding that more collaboration time is one piece of the adjusted calendar puzzle that is needed in Crittenden County.

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Lunsford, **McConnell** to face in **November**

A heated race for the Democratic presidential nomination led to record turnout for a Kentucky primary, but the only race that appears to matter is that for U.S. Senator.

Hillary Clinton claimed Kentucky's Democratic delegates with overwhelming support across the commonwealth, but Barack Obama's victory in Oregon all but sealed his party's nomination.

Meantime, Bruce Lunsford of Louisville held off Greg Fischer and five other candidates to grab the Democrats' spot on the November U.S. Senate ballot. Lunsford was also a candidate for governor in last year's primary.

On the GOP ticket, Senate minority leader Mitch McConnell captured 86 percent of the vote to defeat political unknown Daniel Essek. The four-term senator from Louisville will face Lunsford in the Nov. 4 general election.

John McCain already has enough delegates to garner the Repubican nomination for president this summer; still, party members drawn to the statewide senate race cast

seven of 10 votes for McCain. Results in the county mirrored that of state voters from both parties.

Crittenden County Clerk Carolyn Byford reported a 29percent turnout with no major problems at the polls. Statewide, with the help of 43 percent of eligible Democratic voters, turnout broke the previous record for a primary in the commonwealth. This year's 33.6 percent turnout eclipsed the 26.5 showing in 1992.

Also, Democrat Carroll defeated Hubbard Johnson in the 1st Senatorial Disrict Primary. Hubbard will face Ken Winters in the general election. Both men have roots in Crittenden County.

Wreck closes 641

Other area crashes kill 1, injure 7

A slew of wrecks in the past week led to the death of an area man, injuries to seven others and the closure of a major road into Crittenden County for up to 12 hours.

Phillip E. Hall, 83, of Fredonia was killed Friday about a mile north of Princeton when he turned from Ky. 139 onto Ky. 91 into the path of a log truck driven by Ollie E. Ferrell, 66, of Salem. The truck slammed into the driver's side of Hall's 2007 Cadillac STS.

Ferrell was uninjured, but Hall, former owner of Hall's Jewelery in Princeton and a board member of Bright Life Farms, was pronounced dead at the scene. Hall's wife and passenger, Katherine, 81, was also injured in the wreck.

On Saturday evening, James T. Hatfield Jr., 65, of Marion was injured in a singlevehicle accident on Ky. 365 in Crittenden County. On his way home from Morganfield where he works as a pharmacist, Hatfield lost control of his 1997 Ford Crown Victoria and struck an earthen embank-

He was taken to Critenden



A May 15 head-on collision on U.S. 641 near the Caldwell County line seriously injured Barry Beard of Marion when he was ejected onto the roadway from his vehicle. According to police, Beard's Toyota passenger car collied with a tanker truck carrying 8,600 gallons of fuel, sending both vehicles from the roadway. The driver of the tanker suffered only minor injuries, but the road was closed for 12 hours until all the fuel could be safely offloaded.

Also on Sunday, two Livingston County residents were hurt in a one-vehicle crash on Nipper Road in Crittenden County. According to state police, Ashley M. Shafer, 16, of Ledbetter and her passenger, 21-year-old Christopher C. Ramage of Salem, were hurt when their truck left the gravel roadway and struck a tree. Both were taken to Crittenden Hospital and later transported to Hospital

Evansville for treatment of their leg injuries.

Ramage was cited for various traffic offenses.

On Monday, two separate one-car crashes injured one.

An early-morning wreck on Ky. 91 North left David Smith, 21, of Marion uninjured when his vehicle overturned attempting to avoid a deer. However, a wreck on U.S. 60 East at the intersection of Ky. 365 injured the driver of a delivery van headed east. He appeared to have suffered an arm injury, but no further details were available at press time.

Hatfield said increasing pay to \$40 per run or training drill is a tiny price to pay for the protection provided by the fire department. The matter will be decided upon at Friday's meeting.



Lortabs and Percocets. No gun was seen and the pharmacy clerk called for a supervisor. In the meantime, the two suspects fled without getting any drugs. They left Morganfield in a small Ford pickup.

Morganfield police issued robbery warrants for the two suspects and put out a description of the vehicle to other police agencies.

State police were notified at about 6 p.m., about the attempted robbery. Two hours later, Trooper

William Braden saw a vehicle matching that description parked in front of room 4 at the motel, formerly Tobin's Tourotel. Marion police officers, including Chief Ray O'Neal and patrolmen Bobby

West and Marty Hodge were dispatched to the scene to provide assistance because it was believed that the suspect might be armed. Officers made contact with

the suspects, but couldn't convince them to surrender, State Police spokesman Stu Recke said. During negotiations, Dockery looked out a window and aimed a handgun at Marion policeman Marty Hodge. Braden then fired twice at Dockery through the window, hitting him at least Dockery never fired, and no

officer or bystanders were injured, Recke said.

Dockery was taken to Crittenden County Hospital at 8:15 p.m., then transferred to Deaconess Hospital Evansville at about 10 p.m.

He was transfered by ambulance with a police escort. More than one dozen state policemen and detectives converged on the motel and processed the shooting scene. They were there until 7 a.m., the next morning. No guests were allowed to return to their rooms at the inn until after midnight.

State police have an arrest warrant for attempted murder of a police officer awaiting Dockrey upon his release from the hospital.

Rushin was arrested at the motel on a robbery charge stemming from the incident at Wal-Mart and a warrant for failure to appear in court in Hopkins County. She was taken to the Crittenden County Jail.

Braden, a seven-year state police veteran, was placed on paid administrative leave pending an internal investigation, standard state police procedure when a trooper is involved in a use of force that results in an injury or death, Lt. Phil Crumpton, a state spokesman police Frankfort, told the Paducah Sun last week.

The trooper, who lives in Webster County, had just two weeks earlier received a citation for bravery for shooting and killing another man who brandished a machete in a confrontation Webster County. Braden was cleared of any wrongdoing in that incident. Crumpton said Braden went to a home where a woman had called to report a man outside threatening to kill her and her family. When Braden arrived he saw Jeffery

D. McKinley, 41, of Dixon out-

side the home. Crumpton said

McKinley grabbed a 25-inch

machete and began walking

toward Braden, who warned him to stop and then shot and killed McKinley when he

refused to drop the weapon. Crumpton said while investigations into trooperinvolved shooting vary, they generally take a minimum of 30 days. Two lieutenants from outside the post's area will come in and investigate the shooting just like any other case, then take their findings to the commonwealth attorney, who will then decide whether to take the case to a grand jury, Crumpton said.

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



exact date of his birth is disputed. When his Kentucky owner returned after a year of enlistment in the Confederate Army to bring Smith back to the South to serve with him, the slave ran away, heading for Smithland. A series of fortunate events led Smith to Clinton, Ill., where he joined the 55th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment of the U.S. Army on May 16, 1863.

While fighting with the 55th, Smith earned distinction for his heroic actions during the Battle of Honey Hill, S.C., on Nov. 30, 1864. Smith saved his regimental color after the color-bearer was killed and kept the colors flying throughout the battle despite harsh conditions and fierce battle.

He was nominated for the Medal of Honor, the highest military honor available to any soldier, in 1916, but was denied. It was not until 69 years after his death in Livingston County President Bill Clinton in 2001 finally bestowed the honor upon Smith's descendants.

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INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Crittenden County Property Assessment roll will be open from Tuesday, May 27 through Tuesday, June 10, 2008 for the 2008 Tax Year. Under the supervision of the P.V.A. or one of the Deputies, any person may inspect the assessment roll.

This is the January 1, 2008 assessment on which state, county, school and other districts taxes will be due this fall.

may be inspected between the hours of 7:30 am to 4:30 pm Monday through Thursday and 7:30 to 4 pm on Fridays and 8 am to 12 pm on Saturdays during this period.

The assessment roll is in the office of the P.V.A. in the county courthouse and

Any property owner desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any property owner still aggrieved by an assessment on real property after the

conference with the PVA or designated deputy may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals. The property owner can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a

letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the prop-

The appeal must be filed with the County Clerk's office no later than one working day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any property owner failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by a designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property owners shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a property owner does not agree with the assessed value of personal property.

- 1) Property owner must list under protest (for certification) what they believe to be the fair cash value of their property.
- 2) Personal property owners must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of
- 3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- 4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

(The Crittenden County PVA Office is responsible for the assessment of property; however we do not set tax rates or collect taxes.)


