KU proposes rate increase

STAFF REPORT

One of Crittenden County's electricity providers is petitioning the state for a two percent rate increase, saying the money is necessary to upgrade equipment to meet a growing demand for energy.

The increase proposed by Kentucky Utilities (KU) will cause some customers to watch power consumption closer, while others say there is little that can be done.

"As a school district, we're going to have to be more mindful and conservative of our usage," said Dr. Rachel Yarbrough, superintendent of Crittenden County schools.

For the district, the proposed increase would amount to about \$5,000 more annually. District finance officer Brent Highfil said the hike would bring the total utility cost to just more than \$250,000. KU says if the increase is granted by the

Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC), new rates could take effect as early as February. For residential customers, the rate hike would mean \$4.50 more a month on an average bill. Ann Cooper, a Marion senior on a fixed

income, said she doesn't like it, but doesn't expect the increase to ruin her budget. The formal rate hike request by KU will

go to the PSC on July 29.

Jim Christensen, CEO of Crittenden Health Systems, took the news in stride. "We're not going to clamor too loudly," he said. "Boy, it could be lot worse."

across the street from the farmers market. "The days they were closed there were numerous cars over there and even people would come in here and ask why they were closed."

Croft, who has been going to the market since its inception in 2000, said that Greg was very nice and helpful with her and the other customers.

"I felt so sorry for them and had so much sympathy for them," she said of Greg's family.

The family has been involved in produce sales since 1954, but Bill's failing health forced his son to take over the long days at the market this spring. Following Greg's death, many questioned whether or not the market would continue, since the major-

The family considered ceasing their vending at the market altogether, but Roberson said Bill and Becky Stallion, Greg's parents, are back at the market despite struggles to stay motivated.

"She didn't want to do the market anymore, but we gradually got her back up here," said Roberson of Becky. "She was kind of tired of it, but now she's going strong; it's good therapy for her."

Rose Crider, president of Marion Main Street Inc., which manages the farmers market, was one of those unsure of its future, but said that after meeting with the Stallion family, she was confident fresh produce sales would continue.

"It's a convenience and it's very popular with both locals and tourists," said Crider. "There is always a crowd down there.'

Sales at the market are open to anyone who registers with Marion Main Street and meets minimum

Kentucky's reptile population offers only 4 venomous snakes

In light of the recent snakebite suffered by a Marion mailman and the beginning of blackberry picking season, it seems an appropriate time to take a refresher course in snake identification.

According to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' handbook Kentucky Snakes, there are 32 varieties of slithering creatures that reside in the commonwealth. Only four of them are venomous.

While most snakes found in this part of the state are harmless - and indeed beneficial - there is one common venomous viper that most Kentuckians live next door to. The copperhead is the most widespread of any venomous snake. They are largely nocturnal creatures, feeding at night and spending their daylight hours in a shady, hidden location.

Adult copperheads prey on mice and other small mammals, but will also take frogs, lizards, insects, and the occasional small bird," the KDFWR's snake handbook says.

The other problematic snakes that live in Kentucky are the cottonmouth, which is very, very rare in the upland areas around Crittenden County; the timber rattlesnake, which is found along rocky outcroppings near the Ohio River; and the pygmy rattlesnake,

Venomous snakes found in Kentucky have several distinguishing features. The copperhead has hourglass bands across its back. Non-venomous look-alikes have similar bands but the wide part is at the apex of the snake's back. On the copperhead, the band is smallest at the top of the snake's back.

Venomous snakes have diamond shaped heads and vertical pupils. Nonvenomous have round pupils.

While it's often difficult to use those distinguishing features to positively identify a snake that's either alive or crushed by a shovel, there is one telltale sign that makes identification easy.

As the diagram at right shows, a venomous snake will have a single row of scales at the tip of its tale behind the anal plate. A non-venomous snake has a double row of scales.

If you are bitten by a venomous snake, seek medical attention immediately. Very few people die from snakebites, but they can be very painful. If you are not sure whether the creature that bit you is venomous, it's best to seek medical attention promptly and, if possible and safe, kill the snake and take it with you to the hospital. Never handle a venomous snake, even

Skate park may be in jeopardy

If use doesn't increase, the future of the new skateboarding facility at Marion-Crittenden County Park could be in jeopardy, according to Administrator Mark Bryant.

Bryant said insurance premiums for the city's park system have doubled this year due to the skate park. The \$3,500 hike is more than it used to cost to insure both the city-county park and Veterans Park.

While calls to police to disperse skateboarders from private properties have dropped, the calls do continue, and Bryant said he has seen few to no skaters at the park during periodic checks. The additional premiums can hardly be justified with such little use, he said.

He added that shoes tossed and hanging over power lines near the facility constitute an abuse and have been the source of some complaints.



City warning of routine line flush

Mark Bryant is asking city residents to check their water before using it next week.

The City of Marion will perform routine flushing of its water system, beginning Monday and lasting through July 18. Bryant, Marion's city administrator, said the flushing will take place each night between 9 p.m. and 5 a.m.

"During this period, it is possible that residents may experience low water pressure and discoloration or reddening of the water for short periods, Bryant said.

The City advises residents to pay particular attention to the color of their water prior to washing white garments.

"If you experience discoloration, let the water run for a few minutes to allow it to clear," Bryant added. "The City apologizes for any inconvenience caused by these system maintenance efforts."



At Madisonville, Hatfield said local families can find a quality education at an affordable cost and close to home.

With scholarship money exclusively earmarked for Crittenden County students and an average of about \$1,200 in KEES money, students can go to MCC and earn an associate's degree for under \$4,000, said John Peters, advancement director for the college.

"When it comes down to economic factors that we all deal with these days, certainly the amount of education one can get for the money should be prime concern for parents.' Hatfield said.

The annual cost for attending MCC is roughly \$3,700 per year. Peters and Hatfield say that most Crittenden students qualify for at least \$1,100 in scholarship money. That

2 charged with scrap metal theft

Marion Police Department made two arrests late last week in a criminal theft investigation involving scrap wire and metal from mobile homes on Creek Street.

According to police reports, Brian Anthony Armstrong, 30, and Aaron D. York, 28, both of Marion, are charged with felony theft by unlawful taking. The charges stem from a May 29 case involving two mobile homes in Marion. Reports say that one of the trailers belonging to Jeff Ellis was being torn down and the other was scheduled for demolition. However, before the contractor could disassemble them, police say Armstrong and York made off with some of the valuable materials and took them to a scrap yard in Wheatcroft.

Police Chief Ray O'Neal said Ellis owned both mobile homes and had hired someone to tear them down. The first mobile home had been scrapped out and the valuable materials put into a pile for transport to the recycling center. Before they could be hauled off by the rightful owners, O'Neal said, the two men charged, along with two others who will be charged

Marion Police Officer Jerry Parker headed the investigation and charged Bill Schrimsher, 30, of Marion with theft by unlawful taking. They say evidence indicates that the McDonald's employee failed to make a bank deposit in the amount of missing money. Police reports say that two other deposits were made on the day in question, but a third was not.

O'Neal said the wiring to another mobile home was also taken. The value of the material allegedly stolen and damage to the property will equal about \$2,000, the police chief said.

Police are planning to issue criminal summonses for the two other individuals they believe were involved in the alleged theft.

"(Greg) grew up in the market, it was all he knew and he loved it," added Roberson. "It was the family business and he would want it to go on."

And that doesn't mean for just this year.

"As long as everybody's health is okay, it'll be here again next year. We're going to keep it going as long as we
