

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Tax may be necessary for ambulance

Hospital wants fiscal court to start helping pay EMS costs

County leaders say a cashstrapped local government may have to consider an emergency services tax in order to meet financial demands being made by Crittenden Health Systems (CHS).

The hospital, which has operated the ambulance service pro bono for more than 30 years, wants the county to start putting up a large annual sum to cover the red ink CHS officials say is generated by the ambulance service.

Hospital and county leaders have been hashing out the matter for a few months. It's not the first time the issue has come up in local government, but this time hospital officials say it's necessary.

By statute, Crittenden County is

obligated to provide ambulance service. The hospital has turned EMS into an Advanced Life Support (ALS) service over the years with a roundthe-clock crew and four ambulances.

The hospital has asked the county for \$90,000 in the 2011-12 budget and has made it clear that it expects four or five times that amount in later years.

"We'd like to give you time to put this into your budget as a line item," CHS CEO Jim Christensen told magistrates during a special fiscal court meeting last week. The called meeting was attended by most of the hospital's board of directors.

Judge-Executive Perry Newcom said the county is applying for a grant in the amount of \$90,000 to buy a new ambulance. The county wants the hospital to accept that

overture as its contribution for the coming fiscal year, in lieu of cash.

Hospital officials seem content with that proposal. They want to replace a 2001 model ambulance that has 136,318 miles on it. However, the CEO asked what if the county fails to qualify for the grant.

Newcom said the application is due next month. The county should know by July or August whether it will get the money. If not, he said the county would have to dip into cash reserves to meet the hospital's request for \$90,000. Of course that would require approval by the fiscal

The looming issue on the horizon is where will the county come up with \$350,000 to \$450,000 in cash to supplement yearly ambulance operation starting next year. Its coal severance funds have finally run out, five years after the mine off Ky. 365 quit hauling coal. The county had received millions in state funds for being a coal-producing county.

Crittenden Hospital, which operated at a deficit last year, says the ambulance is part of the reason it's losing money. EMS has lost at least \$383,000 the past three years and it's projected to be \$335,000 in the hole at the end of this fiscal year in October. The service is budgeted to spend about \$716,000 this year and take in \$395,000 in fees. Hospital

Getting Greener

Belt's cardboard recycling business expanding rapidly

Eddie Lee Belt has educated himself about recycling, started his own consulting company and built a small business in Marion that employs four

His entire operation revolves around recyclable trash, mostly cardboard and

"For every ton of cardboard we bale, it saves 682.5 gallons of oil and 17 trees and 7,000 gallons of water," said Belt, standing in front of a large pile of boxes being processed for the baler.

Belt is already expanding his business, building an addition onto the facility he bought about two years ago. Most locals know it as the old ice house on the corner of East Bellville and Kevil

Workers process by hand about 40 tons of cardboard and paper each month, taking out plastic and other material unsuitable for recycling. A six-foot baler turns the trash into 1,400-pound blocks of material held together by baling wire. Transport trucks unload raw material and pick up bales regularly at Belt's recycling center. The bales go to mills down South that turn it into a slurry to mix with wood pulp for making paper.

Belt's recyclable material comes from a variety of small, medium and large producers in the area, mostly retail businesses and manufacturing fa-



cilities. Some of it he picks up on regular routes throughout the region. The material is primarily corrugated cardboard but also includes newspapers and shredded paper.

"We're working toward expanding into baling other material," said Belt, a 34-year-old Marion native. "If we get some of the jobs I've been working on, we could be working three shifts.'

Belt devised a plan to start the business just over a year ago when he saw a need for a regional hub for processing and baling cardboard. He operates a waste audit consulting firm named Commercial Waste Consulting. Most of his recycling center business comes from customers for which he's done consulting work.

"The main thing is that we keep this material out of landfills. It's a socially responsible thing to do," Belt said. "We have dozens of accounts throughout western Kentucky. With this whole gogreen push it's a matter of time before the government makes us all recycle."

Marion couple arrested

A Marion couple had been under surveillance for several days before their arrest Sunday afternoon in Paducah on various drug charges.

McCracken County Sheriff's Department seized \$13,000 worth of marijuana and arrested Miguel A. Gutierrez, 37, of Sturgis Road with trafficking in marijuana over five pounds, a Class C felony; trafficking in marijuana over eight ounces, a Class D felony; failure to appear to court; and for being a fugitive from justice based on multiple outstandwarrants from McCracken

County and Massac County, Ill. Also arrested was Katherine R.

Lapierre, 20, of Marion. She is charged with operating on a suspended license and trafficking in marijuana over five pounds.

McCracken County detectives seized a 2002 Dodge Caravan, which was being driven by Lapierre.

According to published reports, McCracken County Sheriff's Department Drug Division began investigating Gutierrez and Katherine Lapierre after receiving a tip that the two were selling large amounts of marijuana in western Kentucky and southern Illinois. The investigation revealed the two were purchasing the marijuana in Illinois and distributing it throughout the region, according to the Paducah Sun. Authorities obtained an arrest warrant for Gutierrez and soon learned that the two were transporting more marijuana. At 1:45 p.m., detectives stopped their vehicle on Interstate 24 and arrested Gutierrez. A search of Gutierrez found several hundred dollars, believed to be proceeds from drug sales, reported the Paducah newspaper citing a source from within the sheriff's department.

During a search of the vehicle, detectives seized 11 pounds of marijuana with a street value of more than \$13,000.

At 2:30 p.m., Sunday Detective Robbie Kirk of the Pennyrile Narcotics Task Force and Marion Police Chief Ray O'Neal executed a search warrant on the couple's Marion residence at 302 Sturgis Road next door to the Pamida shopping center. At the home, detectives seized a .40caliber semi-automatic handgun. As a convicted felon, Gutierrez is not allowed to posses firearms, reported the Sun.

County looking for new ways to help local manufacturer

Crittenden County Fiscal Court has denied a request by Harmine Enterprises and Maple Leaf Plastics of Marion to forgive its property taxes. The owners had requested a tax abatement as an incentive for economic development. The company is expanding, hiring new workers and adding a second shift.

Magistrates said they would like to help the company in some fashion, but abating taxes in not within the statutory limits of authority.

Judge-Executive Perry Newcom said the county is working with the Kentucky Association of Counties to put together some type of incentive plan for the company, which is building a 5,000-square-foot expansion at its facility (the former Chrysler building).

The City of Marion, which operates under different laws, was able to abate property taxes for the company for five

Marion man charged in Bowling Green

A Marion man charged with illegally entering the home of Crittenden County Clerk Carolyn Byford last month has gotten into trouble in Bowling Green where he was at a court-ordered rehabilitation center.

Benjamin J. Williams, 37, is charged with second-degree burglary, possession of drug paraphernalia, and possession of a controlled substance (codeine).

According to a police report, authorities in Bowling Green received a complaint at 10:41 p.m., May 14 from a homeowner alleging someone had broken into their home. When police arrived they found Williams asleep on a couch. The owner stated he did not know him. Williams had allegedly broken out a screen from a window to enter the home.

Williams told police he thought he was at a friend's house

Officers allegedly found a ceramic pipe and two hydrocodone pills in Williams' pocket.

He was lodged in the Warren County Jail.

CCMS student is charged with knife incident at school

A Crittenden County Middle School student has been charged with taking a knife to school.

School officials will not discuss the matter, citing state and federal laws that provide for complete privacy of student disciplinary records.

Based on school policy, bringing a weapon to school is among the most serious offenses a student can commit. Doing so leads to immediate suspension and a disciplinary hearing is scheduled in front of the school board. The board has held two disciplinary hearings in the past month, but it does not provide details from those meetings.

Local police confirm that they were called to the alternative school in late March. A sheath knife was turned over to the investigating officer and criminal charges were filed, citing the student for possession of a weapon on school property.

An adult having a weapon on school property would be charged with a Class D felony. Juvenile court cases are private so it's not clear what has or will happen to the student in the legal system.

According to fellow students, the student charged with bringing the knife to school has not returned since the incident

It's not certain whether the student was expelled, or if so, for how long. Based on similar cases here and at other school districts, a student

found guilty of bringing a weapon to school would likely be expelled for the maximum term of one year.

City working toward new sidewalks and bridge on W. Elm

Marion City Council met in special session last week to discuss six agenda items. The council approved a resolution to adjust the starting pay rates for police officers and 911 dispatchers who do not have a diploma from the Kentucky Department of Criminal Justice at the time of being hired. The resolution sets the employee's pay at 90 percent of the total salary established for the position until they successfully complete training and receive the diploma. Upon completion, the employee will receive 100 percent of the pay rate established for the position.

The council also authorized Mayor Mickey Alexander to sign an agreement on the Safe Routes to School Project with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet. The agreement provides \$122,000 in funding for the City of Marion SRTS project which will be used to restructure the walking bridge across Rocket Creek behind the high school. The grant also will fund a sidewalk extension on West Elm Street.

Fan drive to benefit families


Imagine living in sweltering heat, unable to cool down your home because you cannot afford an air conditioner or even a fan. This is the reality for some low-income Marion residents. For the elderly, persons with disabilities and children, the heat of summer can be

more than just uncomfortable, it can be life-threatening.

Low-income families often cannot afford air conditioning and have to face the summer heat with little relief. However, fans can help individuals safeguard against heat-related illness by circulating the air. A fan drive at the Pennyrile Allied Community Services office seeks to collect fans for local low-income households to make surviving the Kentucky summer much easier for residents vulnerable to the high temperatures.

Kathy Penn, with the PACS office, said there have already been several requests by local families, but no fans have been donated. The goal for the fan drive is to get at least 30 fans. 

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
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Old landmarks fading with time but history remains

den County, as they are in most other places, are disappearing one by one. We hate to see them go, but there's just not a way to keep them with us. Maybe with pictures and retelling their stories, we will help preserve them a while longer.

Old barns are some of the landmarks that are passing away with time. Two in Crittenden County are even more notable than most. They are the two barns that have the Mail Pouch Tobacco sign on

Almost faded away now is the advertisement on these two barns. I had no idea how unique these barns were to our past history, not just to Crittenden County's history but all through the Midwest. We were really special to have two of these in our county. Seeing these advertisements on the barns all my life, I thought nothing about them. Now after all these years I learned the history of those painted barns.

One of the barns is located on U.S. 60 East and the other on U.S. 60 West on Alex and Stacey Summers'

The painting of Mail Pouch Tobacco barn signs started around 1925. Two-man crews traveled the Midwest in Model T trucks, painting the signs in about half a day. They painted the slogan on the side of a willing farmer's barn in exchange for a choice of several things, such as cash, magazine subscriptions or of course, a hefty supply of Mail Pouch chewing tobacco. Another popular option was that the farmer could have the rest of his barn painted.

The last living Mail Pouch painter was Harley Warrick. He joined the crew when he returned from service in World War II. It usually took Warrick about four hours to paint the side of a building. He had once said that his first 1,000 or so signs looked like he'd painted them with his feet, but eventually he got the hang of it.

At one time there were more than 10,000 of these landmarks dotting the countryside in the midwest, but now less than half remain. Hundreds of these barns were painted through the years, but they are disappearing fast and this piece of Americana will soon be a thing of the past.

Long a part of American culture, the Mail Pouch Chewing Tobacco signs on barns, bridges and buildings are among the early examples of outdoor advertising. The signs first appeared in the late 19th century when Bloch Brothers Tobacco Company of Wheeling, W. Va., began to use painted signs to promote their tobacco. By 1930, signs bearing the slogan, "Chew Mail Pouch Tobacco, Treat Yourself to the Best," were appearing in what became trademark yellow and white letters on a black background.

Bloch Brothers concentrated its advertising in rural areas where chewing tobacco was popular. Most of the signs were in nine states: West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana, New York, southern Michigan and western Maryland.

The company employed "space men" who would find barns and buildings that could easily be seen by passersby and negotiate a lease-for-sign space with the farmer or owner. Contract workers were paid by the square foot to paint the signs. The average life of a sign was 30 to 40 years.

By the 1960s, Bloch Brothers began cutting back on its sign-painting campaign for several reasons. The rural population was declining as people moved to urban areas and as television and radio were taking over the advertising market, new regulations governed tobacco advertising, and federal highways legislation barred outdoor advertising within 660 feet of a federally funded





road.

In 1969, the company stopped painting new barn signs. Within a few years. however, the company began repainting some signs. In 1974, Congress designated Mail Pouch signs as national historic landmarks. Harley Warrick, the last of the barn painters, painted a Mail Pouch sign on a clapboard wall inside the State Museum in Charleston in 1976.

There were other barn painters, but Harley Warrick was the best known for his work painting the Mail Pouch tobacco advertising. Warrick and a partner traveled from town-to-town, sometimes sleeping in the back of a pickup truck or cheap motel. They would often be on the road for months at a time. With the partner painting the black background and Warrick painting the letters, they were able to paint two barns

Warrick used no template or tools, painting the sides of barns entirely by eye. He would start with the letter 'E' in "CHEW' and then add the 'W' and then 'CH'. He would sometimes deliberately misspell words to see how many phone calls the tobacco company would get about it. He said that once in a while he'd put three 'C's in 'TOBACCO' just to see if anyone noticed.

Many people have traveled the countryside searching out and taking photographs of these soon to be gone barn advertisements. I wonder if the two in Crittenden County are in someone's treasured photographs.

Although past its prime now and almost totally gone from sight due to time and the elements of the harsh weather, there was a familiar sight on a barn roof located between Fredonia and Caldwell Princeton in County. It was the "SEE ROCK CITY" sign painted in

large white letters on a black

background. As a youngster headed on vacation to Tennessee, these advertisements on roof barns along the old route 41 could set a young mind to imagining all kinds of wonderous sights one would see when they finally reached this strange and magical place on top of a mountain (I wasn't

disappointed either). Rock City opened as a public attraction in 1932. It got off to a slow start, because advertising in those days was difficult. Garnet Carter, owner of the mountain-top attraction, enlisted the help of a young sign painter who was hired to travel the nation's highways and offer to paint farmers' barn roofs in exchange for letting him paint three simple words; See Rock City. The distinctive black-and-white signs appeared as far north as Michigan and as far west as Texas. The advertising soon began to produce the desired effect and by the close of the 1930s more travelers than ever had seen Rock City Gardens.

Now these magical three word advertisements are just another piece of Americana gone from sight.

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
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

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No. 6 Hoptown shoots down Rockets

Crittenden closes season with losses at district, region

As if facing Hopkinsville, the sixth-ranked team in the state and the defending Second Region champion wasn't enough Monday at Christian County, the Rockets also had the heat to deal with.

Three heat delays totaling two hours and 58 minutes made their 16-0, five-inning setback much longer and less tolerable.

The first delay occurred just before the start of the top of the second, the next came one inning later and the last 12-minute stoppage took place after the bottom of the fourth.

Trailing 1-0 in the top of the second, the Rockets had an early chance of keeping the game closer. Brian Berry led off the frame with a walk and advanced to second on a one-out single by Taylor Champion. With two outs, Rocket second baseman Landon Young laced a single to left field and Berry was thrown out at the plate trying to score.

The heavily-favored Tigers took advantage of seven Rocket errors and batted around twice in four innings, blowing the game open with a six-run second frame.

It must have felt like an eternity for the Rockets (6-22) as the game didn't appear like it would ever end due to all the lengthy heat delays.

The contest was not completed until four hours and 20 minutes after the first pitch was thrown. Fifth District Championship

Unfortunately for the Rockets, fate was on the Wildcats' side as Trigg County upended CCHS 8-4 to claim their first tournament crown since 2007. Ironically, that championship four years ago was also won at Smithland over the Rockets.

opportunities. A two-out walk to right fielder Noah Dickerson followed by a single from Landon Young put runners on, but Willis flew out to right for the third out.


Trigg got even more comfortable in the bottom of the fifth, converting three hits, a walk and a fielder's choice into an 8-1 cushion.

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Mineral show, digs are this weekend

Jewelry making class included at Fohs Hall

This weekend marks the sixth-annual Gem, Mineral, Fossil and Jewelry Show and Dig event at Fohs Hall in Marion.

The Saturday and Sunday show and field trips are hosted by the Ben E. Clement Mineral Museum. Activities and tours at the museum will last until Sunday afternoon.

Tina Walker, museum curator, said there will be a host of activities and guest speakers, including the opportunity to dig for minerals both day and night at five former mining sites across the county. There is also an interactive addition to the

"This year we are offering wire-wrapping jewelry class," Walker said. "People will get to take home two pieces of jewelry and learn something that will last a lifetime.'

There is a fee for the jewelry class. Admission is free to the mineral show that begins at 9 a.m., on Saturday and 10 a.m., on Sunday. The Clement collection offers a great attraction for families and children. They can view specimens and history that detail fluorspar mining's history in Crittenden County.

Previous events have

drawn around 500 people over the two-day period. It brings folks from across the country to Marion, said

"We have groups coming from several states including Michigan and North Carolina," Walker added. "They spend the entire weekend here which is a real boost for the local economy."

Among the greatest attractions at the show are the field trip digs at old mining locations. Participants can take home up to a five gallon bucket full of material collected from the earth.

The dig, which costs \$40 per person, is offered during the day, from 9 a.m., to $\bar{4}$ p.m. The nighttime dig starts at 8 p.m., and lasts for two hours.

"The digs are a major

support system for the museum," Walker stated.

There will also be door prizes given away every hour for those in attendance, along with silent auctions where people can bid on dozens of rocks and minerals offered at the show.

Vendors from across the nation make the journey to the museum, showing off their own collections of raw minerals, jewelry and anything that can be made out of rocks, said Walker.

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County getting electric-powered school bus

Less than a month after submitting a grant application for a hybrid bus through the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE), Crittenden County School District was notified on May 17 that it was approved for the \$59,314 grant. The bus Crittenden will be receiving is a Maxforce DT model with a passenger capacity of 66.

The bus, which has an option to run electrically or

ered to Crittenden County by late fall. Director of Transportation Al Starnes said the district is already going over final inspections of buses before deciding where to place the hybrid rig to get the most benefit. Although not permanent, Starnes believes that it will be placed on an in-town route where speeds wouldn't normally exceed 35 mph, keeping the bus running on electric power and saving

The hybrid buses are part of a new program through the KDE that tests the practicality of the vehicles in school districts. After receiving \$12.98 million in funding, KDE purchased 213 hybrid buses and has been using grants to place them in Kentucky school districts. Hybrid buses are twice the price of diesel buses. They cost about \$130,000 but with the help of the KDE grants, districts only have to

the cost. KDE will cover \$59,314 as part of Crittenden County's grant, leaving the district to pay the remaining \$78,484. The cost before the grant was \$137,798.

"The grant helps to bring the cost down to what a district would typically spend on an average bus," Starnes said. "We're excited about this effort and we can't wait to get it and put it to use."

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

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# There is nothing that we can hide from God

Did you read about the fugitive who captured himself? A man in Bangor, Maine was wanted for failing to pay fines. To his credit, he was going about town doing yard work (perhaps to pay the fines). He carried his cell phone in his leaf blower back pack. The cell phone made him readily available to customers. Unbeknownst to him, however, his cell phone was repeatedly dialing 911. By triangulating the calls, the police were able to locate him. Since there were two



active warrants for his arrest, the police took him into custody. The newspaper heading for this story read — "Dial M for

We smile about this report. It seems the gentleman was quite unlucky or maybe just a little dumb. How long can one evade the police if there are two warrants for your arrest? And what about the fines? Did he think he could escape paying them? He could hide for a time but not forever. Of course, if he had obeyed the law, he would not have needed to hide.

This episode reminds me of the Psalmist's lament. He said. "Where can I go to hide from your presence, Lord? If I go up

to heaven, You are there. If I go down to hell, You are there. Even darkness does not hide me from You." (Psalm 139) Each time I read that Psalm I wonder why the Psalmist would want to take cover from God. What had he done or not done?

My seminary professor used to say, "We hide much of ourselves from others. In fact, when we walk down the street, we let people see about ten percent of who we are. Then, when we go home, we take off another five percent." He went on to explain we are fearful that if people really get to know us they won't like us.

That may be true of the human situation, but it is not true of God. God knows everything about us. The Psalmist was right when he said there is nothing we can hide from God. He knows us better than we know ourselves; yet, He not only likes us, He loves us. Paul said, "Nothing separates us from the love of God . . . not height, not depth . . .," not even our own sinfulness.

You are my hiding place; you will protect me from trouble and surround me with songs of deliverance. Selah."

#### Seminary professor tapped to lead Kentucky Baptists

Paul Chitwood, a pastor who also serves as a professor at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, has been nominated to become executive director of the Kentucky Baptist Convention.

The convention's Mission Board is scheduled to vote Thursday on Chitwood's nomination to lead the organization, which coordinates work among 2,400 churches that make up the state's largest religious denomination, according to The Courier-Journal of Louisville.

Chitwood would replace longtime director Bill Mackey, who is retiring.

Chitwood, 41, is pastor of First Baptist Church of Mount Washington in Bullitt County. The church reports 1,890 members and an average weekly attendance of 852.

Paul Badgett, who chaired the search committee that recommended Chitwood, said

the Bullitt County pastor is "educationally prepared, he's a spiritual man (and) ... his style of leadership is one of listening.'

The nomination comes as the convention is cutting back staff and sending more money to its national affiliate, the Southern Baptist Convention.

In January, the convention announced cuts of five fulltime and 19 part-time positions, along with a salary

Chitwood has previously served as Kentucky Baptist Convention president, as a chairman of the Southern Baptists' International Mission Board and in numerous other denominational roles.

The appointment of Chitwood, an assistant professor of evangelism and church growth at Southern Seminary. highlights the increasingly close ties between the Kentucky and Southern Baptist conventions.







# **Quiet holiday in Marion**

Marion Police Chief Ray and Crittenden County Sheriff Wayne Agent say the Memorial Day holiday weekend was a very quiet one in the county.

The sheriff's department

is investigating a pickup truck allegedly stolen from Tanner Beavers over the weekend. The vehicle has already been recovered, the sheriff said.

There were a few citations written in Marion for drivers not wearing seat belts and other traffic violations, but no major infractions.

A few domestic disputes were reported, but otherwise there were no serious incidents or highway accidents in Crittenden County.

#### Appeals court denies rehearing

The Kentucky Court of Appeals has denied a rehearing regarding federal civil rights issues in the Frederica Hargis vs. Crittenden County Board of Education lawsuit.

The appeals court affirmed part of Crittenden Circuit Court's ruling and reversed part in an appeal of summary judgement denial initiated in September 2009 by the school's attorney.

The appeals court says Hargis' claim of federal civil rights infringement may continue in Crittenden Circuit Court.

Hargis was fired in 2004 after being charged with wanton endangerment for

running over a woman's foot in a parking lot of a local beauty shop. She filed suit in 2005, claiming wrongful termination and breach of contract. Part of her suit relies upon a broad federal law, 42 U.S.C. 1983, as a cause of action against the board. Hargis claims that her civil rights were violated by the board's decision to fire her.

Hargis also filed a separate defamation suit against several Marion residents and business in 2005. Some of the defendants have been released from liability. Attorneys for the remaining defendants have asked that their clients be released too.

Federal, state, and local environmental regulations require KU to build and upgrade equipment and facilities to operate in a intally sound manner. Specifically, KU is seeking Commission approval of Certificates of Public Convenience and Necessity "CPCN") to construct new Particulate Matter Control Systems to serve all units at the Ghent Generating Station in Ghent, Kentucky, and o serve all units at the E.W. Brown Generating Station in Burgin, Kentucky, to comply with the national emissions standards for hazardous air pollutants proposed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA"). The Particulate Matter Control Systems are also seing installed to comply with EPA-imposed sulfuric acid mist and opacity requirements. ## Elementary numbers are growing

BY JERRITT HOVEY-BROWN PRESS REPORTER

With 688 students this past school year, Crittenden County Elementary School was close to bursting at the seams, creating a need to add four more teachers to handle the influx of students. For the upcoming school year; however, the enrollment looks to increase again, raising concerns about space.

After double-checking figures, CCES principal Melissa Tabor said that student enrollment will reach around 720, much larger than earlier anticipated. At the end of each year, Tabor goes over the number of incoming kindergarten students from Head Start and adds that to the figure of present students. All grade levels are tallied except for current fifth-graders who will move to the middle school, and a total number of students is then projected. Tabor said that the growing number is a good sign, regardless if it means juggling classrooms around to accommodate more chil-

"A large number like that means that our community is growing and that's a great thing," Tabor said. "Our schools reflect the growth in the community and because of that, we're ready to consider options when it comes to accommodating our students. The only concern is whether we should begin planning for long-term or short-term solutions."

The elementary school has expanded before. Two wings were added onto the school since it was built in 1980. Tabor said there is still space available for another expansion; however, she doesn't think that will be necessary right now.

"I think that the use of mobile classrooms will happen before we add on and that's because we'll need an immediate solution to house our students. Adding on can take months," Tabor said. "We'll do whatever it takes to make it work, though. We're very happy that these students are here."



Before I end this speech, I have one thing to say. Some of you will get it, while the majority will look at me in confusion. Class of 2011, GET YOUR SHOES ON!





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#### Make college more affordable by saving money

When it comes to comparing the costs of various colleges, remember that on the broadest level, costs are divided into billable and non-billable costs. To save money, follow these tips from the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA).

Billable costs are what you have to pay to start college. At a minimum, these costs include tuition and fees. If you're going to live in school-provided housing, billable costs will also include room and board. These costs are called billable because the school will bill you for them.

Non-billable costs include everything else - textbooks; supplies, such as pens and notebooks; transportation; and personal items, such as shampoo, clothes, entertainment, laundry and other expenses.

It's in the room and board and the non-billable costs where you can save money, sometimes lots of money, by smart shopping.

Textbooks are expensive, but students can save money by buying used books whenever possible. You can buy many textbooks online. Renting textbooks is now an option at many schools. Buying notebooks, pens and other supplies in bulk can also help you save money.

If you're attending a school nearby, you can save room and board by commuting from home. It's also possible to cut down on room and board costs by sharing an apartment with friends. However, some colleges require freshmen to live on campus their first year, or possibly even for the first two years.
