#### Tire collection Friday, Saturday

The county's annual waste tire collection event is slated for this week.

Tires can be dropped off at no cost at the road department outside of town on U.S. 60 East from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday and 8

a.m. to noon Saturday. You must be a resident of Crittenden County to participate.

The event is made possible through a grant from the Kentucky Energy and **Environment Cabi**net's Division of Waste Management's Waste Tire Trust Fund. The tires will be recycled for a variety of purposes.

Last year, 12,012 tons of waste tires were collected in Kentucky, more than half of which were gathered at collection events like the one this week in Crittenden County.

#### Farmers invited to aid food banks

With 1 in 6 Kentuckians considered food insecure, hunger is a serious problem in the commonwealth. However, a state program is making it easier than ever for farmers to partner with food banks to provide for those in need.

Through Farm to Food Banks, the Kentucky Association of Food Banks reimburses farmers for the cost of picking, packaging and transporting No. 2-grade produce to the nearest major food bank. Locally, Crittenden County Food Bank expects to receive about \$3,000 in food donations for 2016-17 through the program

"No. 2-grade produce is typically rejected by retailers because of cosmetic imperfections," said Sarah Vaughn, program assistant. "It is nutritious and delicious food that might otherwise go to waste because of a lack of market for it."

The produce is distributed to low-income Kentuckians through the food bank network. The Association connects farmers with either a regional food bank distribution center or local food pantry, depending on the amount of produce available. Participation is open to any Kentucky farmer. For more information, visit KAFB.org/ farmstofoodbanks or call (859) 986-7422.

For the coming fiscal year, Crittenden County Food Bank projects a \$17,200 budget. The food bank distributes about 55 tons of food annually to roughly 220 families.

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## Park bans smoking

Responding to a large number of complaints by park-goers, Marion-Crittenden County Park Board is initiating a plan to make the public facility smoke-

During its regular meeting last week, the six-member park board decided to immediately post smoking" signs on fences at ball fields and to ask local governments to codify the rule by ordinance.

"I'm a smoker myself," said park board Chair Kory Wheeler. "But I don't smoke in the car or around kids. I understand that no one

wants my secondhand board. It's yet to be deter-smoke, and I can apprecimined how the city and ate that."

Park board members say their greatest complaints are when toilet paper runs out in the bathrooms and from people unhappy with secondhand smoke around the dugouts and grandstands at the baseball and softball di-

amonds and near the youth soccer fields. There will be no designated areas for smokers at the park based on the measure approved last

county will handle the matter. Smoking is prohibited inside city and county buildings, but the courthouse and city hall have snuffer boxes outside their entrances to placate smokers.

Wes Hunt, a park director, said the facility is a symbol of health and activity and should promote a smoke-free setting. Board members say runners, walkers, bikers, ball play-



### **Get your kicks on Route 76**

National bicycle route officially marked through county

STAFF REPORT

U.S. Bicycle Route 76, known as the TransAmerica Trail, is now marked through Crittenden County and all of western Kentucky.

Signs have been placed along the route in Kentucky Transportation Cabinet's District 1 and District 2 counties, including Crittenden and Webster.

Route 76 was established in 1976 as part of the country's bicentennial and is celebrating its 40th birthday this year. It was

one of the first two U.S. Bicycle Routes established by

the American Association of State Highand Transportation Officials, the same organization that certifies the United States Numbered Highways system that includes routes such as U.S. 60. The

other original national bike route is Route 1, which runs north-south through

the Atlantic coast states. Transpiration Cabinet

spokesman Keith Todd said a number of cyclists travel through the area

along the route, mainly during the summer months. "I regularly travel along sections of the bike route. During the summer months

you'll encounter cross-country bicyclists a couple of times a week," Todd said. "They range from single bikers to groups of three to

five generally with camping gear strapped to their bicy-

Todd said that motorists who regularly travel highways that carry Route 76 bikers should be prepared to encounter them and, share the road.

"The new signage may not immediately attract additional riders, but it will allow them to more easily travel the route without having to constantly check a map,"

Todd said.

Locally, the Route follows Ky. 120 from the Crittenden-Webster County Line to Marion where it takes Ky. 91 North to the Cave In Rock Ferry to enter Illinois.

Marion Untied Methodist Church is a designated overnight spot for bikers, who get a warm shower and soft sofas to sleep on.

The TransAmerican Bike Race also follows this particular route through western Kentucky. That race starts in Oregon and ends in Virginia, passing through 10 states.

## Ky. joins lawsuit over fed's transgender edict

Gov. Matt Bevin announced Friday that the Commonwealth of Kentucky will be joining a lawsuit against the federal government over new guidelines on how schools should accommodate transgender students.

"The federal government has no authority to dictate local school districts' bathroom and locker room policies," said Gov. Bevin. "The Administration's transgender policy 'guidelines' are an absurd federal overreach into a local issue."

Attorney General Andy Beshear, a Democrat and the son of former Gov. Steve Beshear, refused to join 11 other states that initially filed suit two days earlier.

"Unfortunately, Attorney General Andy Beshear is unwilling to protect Kentucky's control over local issues," the Republican governor said. "Therefore, my administration will do so by joining this lawsuit. We are committed to ... fighting federal overreach into state and local issues."

ers and others who use the park should be granted a more healthy environment.

The park's no-smoking edict includes vapor and ecigarettes.

Many of the leagues that use the park for ballgames already have regulations disallowing tobacco use. High School Federation rules prohibit tobacco use by players and coaches and USSSA which governs youth base-

ball and softball has a tobacco-free policy. Crittenden County Youth Soccer Association recently put snuffer boxes in a designated smoking area away from the playing fields. Based on the park board's decree, that area will be voided as a haven for smokers.

If the county and city adopt ordinances prohibiting smoking at the park, violators could be forced to appear in court and be subject to a fine and court fees that could be in excess of








### School's Out for Summer!

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

## Aaron it Out

#### Lucas finishes 6th in state's 3200 meters; 11th in one-mile run

Crittenden County's Aaron Lucas continues to climb the ladder of success in the 3200-meter race. The sophomore finished sixth Saturday at Lexington in the KHSAA state meet, 11 rungs higher than

his performance a year ago and good enough to earn a medal and a place on the winner's platform with other top finishers. The two-time regional champion

finished the two-mile race in 10:25.44, about five seconds faster than his qualifying finish two weeks ago in the First Region Class A meet at Murray Lucas finished 17th last year in the

state meet with a time of 11:01.47. He's trimmed more than half of a minute off his time in the past year and has his sights set on the school record and perhaps a state championship, but the road will not be clear ahead as several underclassmen have proven themselves in the distance runs.

At Lexington, Lucas was 24 seconds behind the two-mile champion, Keeton Thornsberry, who is just a freshman at Louisville's Holy Cross High School. Thornsberry's time was 10:01.13. Also in front of Lucas in this particular race was a seventh grader, two sophomores and a junior. That means the CCHS harrier will have his work cut out for him moving forward if he wants to win a state championship.





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## Local reservist baking up ideas for unit reunion

A Marion woman is working tirelessly to raise enough money to bring together an Army Reserve unit that was deployed to Afghanistan in 2011.

Baker joined the U.S. Army Reserves in 2008 right after her 18th birthday. She went to school in Union County, but moved to Marion in 2014

shortly before a second deployment to the Middle East. That time she went to Kuwait.

Baker is a transportation management coordinator. In 2011, when the Army Reserve unit at Decatur, Ill., was mobilized, she and about 175 other reservists volunteered to go along for a year.

"The Decatur unit had only 12 people when it was deployed so they asked for volunteers," Baker said.

In that minuteman spirit which helped build America almost 250 years ago, Baker and others from across the country duffled up their gear and fortified the unit.

"There were people from all over," she said proudly. "They are from Puerto Rico, Washington, Indiana, Illinois, Colorado, Ohio and other states. It's been four years since we've seen each other so we wanted to have a reunion.

Baker, a sergeant by rank, has been the commanding general for this operation.

She's already made plans to have the event at Kenlake State Park, complete with a conference room and catered meal. The big problem, however, is the price tag.

"It is going to be over \$3,000 and that doesn't include everyone's travel or their rooms," she said. "So, I thought I would try to raise the money to help pay for some of it so they didn't have to pay so much out of pocket."

Her father, Mickey Baker of Salem, mustered up the ladies at his church, Lola Pentecostal. They're making cakes, pies and other goodies for the bake sale, and others are pitching in on the effort, too. ## GREAT GUNS

#### School Field Trip Armed with Enlightening Weapons

Crittenden County High School's military history class has spent the past nine months studying episodes dating from Moses' escape from Egypt to Ike's assault on German-held Europe. Last week, in the waning hours of the academic year, students held in their hands nuggets of history that they will not soon forget.

They fired a medieval hand cannon, a primitive matchlock rifle, a fully-automatic 30-caliber machine gun capable of burning 750 rounds per minute and several other interesting firearms in between.

"Yes, this is unprecedented," said class instructor Denis Hodge.
"But this is Kentucky."

The blasting took place on a remote Crittenden County farm owned by local gunmaker Bill Wheeler. Round after round was spent with a laudable number of the projectiles hitting their target.

"Yes, this is Kentucky," said Hodge with a chuckle, pointing out that Kentucky boys know their way around rifles and their marksmanship was

well displayed during this back-country laboratory.

Hodge had recruited a number of local weapons experts to help present the history of firearms and to demonstrate their unique and sometimes stubborn behavior.

Adam Barnes, a Revolutionary War enactor and primitive weapons expert, provided students with hands-on opportunities with matchlock and flintlock weapons. The burning rope and flash pan were just as unpredictable for Barnes' demonstration as it was on 15th century battlefields.

"These are the weapons that took well-trained knights off the battlefield and made them officers," Barnes said

Raising a .75-caliber smoothbore above his head, Barnes said, "This is the weapon that we beat His Majesty with, and my daughter killed a 13-point buck with it."

Jeremy Wheeler and Keith Gilbert were among the weapons specialists at the range, pointing out the finer and lesser known facts about a number of weapons from the Springfield 1911 handgun to an M1 Garand, a popu-

lar World War II instrument.

Loading and handling these weapons can be of particular concern. Rules on the range were strict with only one student at a time handling a live weapon.

Bill Wheeler went through the loading process for the early carbines. He said there was indeed a military casualty term known as M1 Thumb. It occurred when soldiers got their thumbs caught in front of the bolt while loading its revolutionary-for-the-time yet cumbersome clip.

Students and instructors discussed everything from


the evolution of ammunition to the Geneva Convention. It was a military-wonk's dream.

Hodge said the field trip was one of several the class has taken this year, including an excursion to the Civil War battlefields at Fort Donelson, Tenn. Although the class was made up largely of seniors, Hodge was encouraged by the fact that almost every one of them showed up for the live-fire class despite soon-to-begraduates being dismissed from classroom obligations on the last week of school.
