

SALUTATORY SPEECH

ood evening everyone. Today is Class Night. I can't believe how fast this year has gone by. Seems like only yesterday Aug. 11 swooped in, announcing the beginning of senior year. Today we are one step closer to being "done," to being only known as the CCHS Class of 2012, to being Crittenden County High School alumni.

When I sat down to write the salutatorian address, a single thought kept running through my head. "I am from...." As the senior class remembers, but some others may not, the first few weeks of sophomore year were spent writing poems about ourselves, more ideally where we're from. Not in the sense of what road you live on or what city you reside, but what makes us, us. What people or places or memories have made you who you are. Prior to senior year, I would have gladly told you that the moment I was handed my fake diploma I would be out of Marion so fast you would be able to smell the burning rubber off my tires for miles. Prior to my senior year I hadn't realized the significance of what graduation really means. Graduation will be the last day the Class of 2012 will be a whole. Graduation will be the last time we will all be to-gether under the same roof as the 2012 senior class.

This got me to thinking about where "I am from." About the knowledge we've all gained, the friendships we've all made, and the connections our class has to each other. As a group we have probably the most sought after characteristics of success: toughness and resilience. And I have no doubts about our class being

At 26, lost the love of his life, and at 27 had a nervous breakdown. At 34 was defeated for Congress, At 46 was defeated for Senate. At 47 was defeated for vice-president. And at 51 was elected President of the United States. This man was Abraham Lincoln, arguably the greatest President this country has ever had. Throughout his life he suffered many more defeats than victories, but because he never gave up, he won the highest office in the land.

I think there is a lot to say of perseverance in a group this size, from a town this small. "Don't let the fear of striking out keep you from playing the game." As I look out over our graduating class it's very easy to see the many different talents among you. Graduates from Crittenden County High

The march has become a graduation staple, but the tune was actually written for a different purpose. Sir Edward Elgar is the composer behind "Pomp and Circumstance," which was named after a line from William Shakespeare's "Othello." Sir Edward composed the song in 1901, and the march was intended for the coronation of King Edward VII. When Elgar received an honorary doctorate from Yale University in 1905, the march was played in his honor as a recessional. Once Yale used the march, other universities



Manage student loan debt without stress

Today's college graduates face numerous challenges. With the global economy still struggling, the job market for recent graduates is less than ideal. Competition for jobs is also heated, as high rates of unemployment have created a job market in which out-of-work yet experienced professionals are routinely competing over entry-level jobs with recent graduates, many of whom in their chosen fields.

But the difficult job market is only part of the troubles recent graduates must face. Mounting debt is a major issue for many college grads. In Canada, for example, the average debt for a university graduate more than doubled between 1990 and 2000. By 2009, Canadian students' collective debt from the Canada Student Loan Program exceeded \$13 billion for the first time in history. Those facing loan repayment while struggling to find a job should consider the following tips.

•Don't delay requests for help. Procrastination isn't a good approach to dealing with debt, whether that debt is from student loans, credit cards or personal loans. Recent graduates who cannot find work or who were laid off should contact their lenders right away and inpostponing monthly payments. It's never good to miss a payment, which will negatively impact an individual's credit rating and is almost certain to draw a financial penalty. If trouble is on the horizon, consult the lender as early as possible. The lender will likely grant a deferment or forbearance, neither of which will tarnish an individual's
