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State police are focusing on belts during holiday

State and local police will be conducting the Click It or Ticket enforcement campaign on area streets and highways through June 6.

The effort started Monday and is a federal highway safety initiative focusing on seatbelt, child restraint enforcement and education. The Memorial Day weekend, which begins Friday and ends Monday, is traditionally the beginning of the summer driving season and police expect a significant increase in traffic. Statewide in 2009, during the four-day holiday weekend, there were 899 collisions on Kentucky's roads that killed nine people and injured 350. During this campaign's two-week duration, state troopers and Marion patrolmen will be targeting those people who are not wearing seatbelts and using child restraints. If you choose not to buckle up, then be prepared to get a ticket, they say. Police will focus their patrols on high volume traffic areas and high crash locations in which speed and impaired driving enforcement will take place. Road checks will be likely in the area.



Man dies in fatal accident Tuesday

A 31-year-old Marion man died in a single-vehicle accident at about 10:30 p.m., Tuesday night on Sisco Chapel Road (Ky. 2123) near the intersection of Nesbitt Hollow Road. The victim was Ricky D. Bradham, who was traveling northbound in his 1998 Dodge Dakota pickup when it went off the shoulder of the highway then crashed. Crittenden County Rescue Squad extricated the victim after the coroner was called to the scene. Coroner Joe Myers said Bradham was partially ejected from the vehicle and died of blunt force trauma.

Deputy Don Perry, who investigated the accident, said Dr. Greg Maddux was on the scene of the accident soon after it happened because he lives nearby. It is believed that Bradham died on impact. He was not wearing a seat belt.

There was another traffic accident Tuesday afternoon on U.S. 641 near the count line that injured a Louisiana woman, Linda Gylbert. She was taken to Crittenden Hospital with minor injuries. The highway was blocked for about an hour.

City council okays \$2.7 budget; pay raises for all

Marion City Council approved a \$2.7 million spending plan during a special meeting Monday evening. Its 2010-11 budget calls for more revenue than the city plans to spend.

A carryover of about \$100,000 is projected by the approved budget. The city also has about \$2.3 million either invested or in reserve in its general fund. A large portion of that came from this year's payoff for its li-

cense for the Smithland Hydro-electric dam project.

City employees, both staff and elected officials, will receive a 2.3-percent raise, based on the consumer index cost-of-living allowance. The pay increase was approved on a 4-2 vote with councilmen Donnie Arflack and Jim Brown dissenting. They had backed a different pay increase plan that would mean a 35-cent-an-hour raise for everyone. The

reasoning was that such an increase would create more equity from top to bottom on the city's pay scale.

Arflack said his proposal of a \$728-annual raise would positively affect almost all city employees while negatively affecting only a handful of higher paid workers. The plan failed to gain any support from a majority of the council.

City Administrator Mark Bryant said the budget is a very conserva-

tive spending plan with very little in the form of capital improvements. The city's plan to build a new fire department on the corner of Main and Bellville streets has not been included at this time. Bryant said it is too early into the planning stages on that project to include hard numbers in the budget. He anticipates borrowing most of the money needed for the project from a low-interest source.

Word may not be in the Bible, but the Trinity is

The word Trinity is not in the Bible but the teachings of the Trinity are there.

This concept begins in the first verse of the Bible where the Hebrew word for God is Elohim which is a plural noun meaning three or more.

bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us," Isaiah 7:14; Matt. 1:23.

Again Isaiah: "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given ... and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." 9:6.

Christ also must have understood the unlimited God when He directed just before His ascension: "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of

all nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Matt. 28:19.

Baptizing in the name of the Trinity is exceedingly improper if the Trinity does not exist. Again, the Trinity simply means God manifests Himself in the form of three persons. Primary election's results will make for interesting fall

Tuesday, May 18. For the third election in a row, this country has seen the winds of change at work; this time it is not against a particular party but against the sitting establishment. Joe Sestak ended Arlen Specter's senate career after refusing to step aside after being begged by the Democratic establishment to do so, Blanche Lincoln, a powerful U.S. senator from Arkansas, was forced into a runoff election by Bill Halter. Rand Paul, a Tea Party favorite, massacred Trey Grayson, who was endorsed by Mitch McConnell and the Republican establishment. Also, Democrats won another seat in the House in the 12th district of Pennsylvania, which is Republican leaning.

There have only been two occasions in 80 years where the current party in power didn't lose seats in the first midterm election: 1932 under FDR dealing with the



Depression and in 2002 with George W. Bush dealing with an uncertain foreign policy for the Middle East. Despite a slow economic recovery, a repeat of the 1994 midterms where Republicans made massive gains is looking less likely than many had thought for four main reasons.

•The GOP has unfortunately become the party of "no," failing to support Wall Street reform, healthcare or even something as simple as Al Franken's anti-rape bill.

•The GOP has followed Rush Limbaugh, Sarah Palin and Glenn Beck into a place where most Americans don't want to be. (Midterms will

uncover the candidates who have the perception of being bipartisan.)

•Michael Steele is running the Republican National Committee into the ground and spending more money than he is bringing in.

•Finally, America has not forgotten that the financial crisis was inherited and not a result of the current administration.

Many Americans, especially Kentuckians, are disgusted with the National Democratic Party for not always correctly interpreting how voters feel; however, if anyone who follows politics has learned anything since 2008, we know that politics can turn on a dime. There is a very thin line between love and hate.

The Democratic Party has more than enough time to reiterate its message of reform and bipartisanship, and the Republicans running for re-election will find

it difficult to not separate from the Republican pack if they plan on winning another term. Republicans like Rand Paul who are referred to as RINO'S (Republicans in Name Only) have the upper hand in the upcoming general election because they are not seen as part of Washington's current problems. They can separate themselves from the current Republican party while catching the breeze on the "Tea Party Express" because they are staunchly against the fiscal policies of the Obama administration and push fiscal conservatism to new bounds. Even John McCain has to hold on for dear life in a Republican primary against a RINO.

The anti-establishment movement is fueling the fire for a very dirty general election. As proven many times before, Pennsylvania is likely to be a bellwether state for

what is to come in the general election. The Democratic win last Tuesday was in a district that is ranked number seven in the worst Democratic

Appalachian Congressional districts. This November, it isn't Democrats vs. Republicans but Moderates vs. Democrats and Republicans. Candidates who would not have had a shot in the world six years ago will dominate our TV and news-

papers, overwhelm our natural scenery, and bore us to death for the next six long months.

Outdoors News & Notes

Health Department warns of mosquito problems; spraying is done upon request by local groups

Recent rains and flooding in many areas of the state may lead to an increase in numbers of mosquitoes, common insects that breed in and around areas of standing water. Kentuckians should take steps to eliminate mosquito breeding grounds to avoid mosquito bites, which can cause illnesses such as West Nile Virus (WNV). "We tend to think of mosquitoes as a nuisance in the summer, but they can be a serious health threat and are known to carry disease," said Kentucky Department of Public Health (DPH) Commissioner William Hacker, M.D. "Some mosquitoes carry West Nile Virus, which can be extremely debilitating and even deadly in some cases. Young children and the elderly are at higher risk for serious illness."

DPH urges residents to maintain prevention efforts not only during times of flooding, but also throughout the summer until a hard freeze occurs: •Survey property for areas of standing water, and eliminate mosquito breeding areas by removing it as it accumulates. Destroy or dispose of tin cans, old tires, buckets, unused plastic swimming pools or other containers that collect and hold water. Do not allow water to accumulate in the containers for more than two days.

•Be aware that mosquitoes are most active at dawn, dusk and early evening, and stay inside if possible.

•Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants outdoors.

•Spray clothing with repellents containing permethrin, DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), picardin or oil of lemon eucalyptus, because mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing. (For more information on insect repellants visit <http://www.cdc.gov/ncidod/dvbid/westnile/RepellentUpdates.htm>.)

•Apply insect repellent sparingly to exposed skin. Be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's directions for use.

•Report swimming pools that are neglected and in a state of disrepair.

Dogs and cats also are susceptible to WNV and other illnesses spread by mosquitoes, so pet owners should use a veterinarian-recommended mosquito and tick repellent. Be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's directions for use. The Kentucky Department of Agriculture (KDA) sprays for mosquitoes at the request of local governments and health departments.

June 1 is deadline to register for ACRE Program

The Farm Service Agency in Kentucky is reminding area farmers and farmland owners that June 1 is the deadline to register for the 2010 Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program or the traditional Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP). "There is only one week left of sign up and there is no late filing period," said John W. McCauley, state executive director of USDA's Farm Service Agency. "This is the last week to ensure you have completed everything to be eligible by the June 1 deadline." For more information about the ACRE program and an online ACRE Calculator, visit www.fsa.usda.gov or contact your local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county office.

Limit on bullfrogs ins 15; season runs to October

The Taking season for bullfrogs opened May 21 and runs through Oct. 31. If a gun or bow and arrow are used, a hunting license is required. If frogs are taken by pole and line, a fishing license is required. If frogs are taken by gig or by hand, then either hunting or fishing license is valid. The daily noon-to-noon creel limit for bullfrogs is 15. The possession limit is 30.

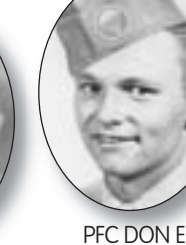

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To a child, love is spelled really T-I-M-E

In the faint light of the attic, an old man, tall and stooped, bent his great frame and made his way to a stack of boxes that sat near one of the little half-windows. Brushing aside a wisp of cobwebs, he tilted the top box toward the light and began to carefully lift out one old photograph album after another. Eyes once bright but now dim searched longingly for the source that had drawn him here.

It began with the fond recollection of the love of his life, long gone, and somewhere in these albums was a photo of her he hoped to rediscover. Silent as a mouse, he patiently opened the long-buried treasures and soon was lost in a sea of memories. Although his world had not stopped spinning when his wife left it, the past was more alive in his heart than his present aloneness.

Setting aside one of the dusty albums, he pulled from the box what appeared to be a



journal from his grown son's childhood. He could not recall ever having seen it before, or that his son had ever kept a journal. "Why did Elizabeth always save the children's old junk?" he wondered, shaking his white head.

Opening the yellowed pages, he glanced over a short entry, and his lips curved in an unconscious smile. Even his eyes brightened as he read the words that spoke clear and sweet to his soul. It was the voice of the little boy who had grown up far too fast in this very house, and whose voice had grown fainter and fainter over the years. In the utter silence

of the attic, the words of a guileless six-year-old worked their magic and carried the old man back to a time almost totally forgotten.

Entry after entry stirred a sentimental hunger in his heart like the longing a gardener feels in the winter for the fragrance of spring flowers. But it was accompanied by the painful memory that his son's simple recollections of those days were far different from his own. But how different? Reminded that he had kept a daily journal of his business activities over the years, he closed his son's journal and turned to leave, having forgotten the cherished photo that originally triggered his search.

Hunched over to keep from bumping his head on the rafters, the old man stepped to the wooden stairway and made his descent, then headed down a carpeted stairway that led to the den. Opening a glass cabinet door, he reached in and pulled out

an old business journal. Turning, he sat down at his desk and placed the two journals beside each other.

His was leather bound and engraved neatly with his name in gold, while his son's was tattered and the name "Jimmy" had been nearly scuffed from its surface. He ran a long skinny finger over the letters, as though he could restore what had been worn away with time and use.

As he opened his journal, the old man's eyes fell upon an inscription that stood out because it was so brief in comparison to other days. In his own neat handwriting were these words: Wasted the whole day fishing with Jimmy. Didn't catch a thing.

With a deep sigh and a shaking hand, he took Jimmy's journal and found the boy's entry for the same day, June 4. Large scrawling letters pressed deeply in the paper read: Went fishing with my dad. Best day of my life.

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

"It's a fantastic opportunity to get some input from everyone, especially the students," Superintendent Dr. Rachel Yarbrough said of the meeting.

This bi-annual event gives the adults involved with the school district a chance to hear what students like and dislike directly from the student leaders of all three schools.

Among some of the positive things mentioned at the meeting were increasing scores, student-centered learning, Head Start program, ACT testing preparation, advanced physical education, variety of clubs and electives to choose from, teachers genuinely care about students, Rocket Arena concrete is repaired, Rocket Role Models and a focus on education and careers, among many other positive points.

Among some of the points students mention needed improvement were the school needs to stop accepting mediocrity, needs more focus on students that do well on a daily basis - not just those who need help, classrooms have too many distractions, a mentor program for older students is needed, dress code needs to be completely enforced or eliminated, more guest speakers, more field trips, more attendance awards, more explanation of testing scores and a program for high-achieving students to have lunch with community members in their career field of interest, among others.

Memorial Day is a special day when we remember and honor the brave men and women who fought for our country and the freedom we have today.

From the archives of The Crittenden Press, during 1944, we can recall the history of some of our local heroes through their letters to family at home and articles from The Press, telling of their bravery and honor to their county.

Through these past articles, may the memory of these men and their days in combat remain with us and remind us to be thankful for their bravery.

February 1944, to Mrs. H. L. Roberts
Dear Aunt,

This is the end of another very busy day, which is just another way of saying I am well. How is everyone back home? I guess I haven't anything to complain about as long as I am well. Sometimes that is a lot to be thankful for. We get downhearted sometimes, but you can't keep the good old Yank spirit down.

We are all waiting for the day when this war is over. I believe there are enough fellows in the service that when they all get back home the good old USA will be a better place in which to live.

I know I have learned what we are fighting for. Some people didn't know just why they were being sent away. I think they know now.

When a fellow is away from civilization for well over a year, he has time to think of things that he never took time to think about before.

I wonder how things have changed since I left. I have been gone nearly two years and I guess there have been several changes since then.

I must close now. Write every chance you have as I like to hear the news from home. That is about all the real enjoyment we get here is the letters from home and friends.

Tell everyone hello, and here's hoping I see you soon.

June 1944, to Phil Milikan

Dear Friend,

Will write you a few lines tonight as I am not busy. This leaves me well and hope you will be the same when you get this.

This is Tuesday night and getting pretty late now. It is pretty tough over here now, but guess it will not last always. If I have to be away from home much longer, I believe I will go completely crazy.

At times I think I cannot go on another day, but guess I will have to continue going ahead until we get the job done on them. Then we can all come back home to stay. I hope Charles will never have to come over here.

Everything about the Army is different over here than it was back in the good old USA. Gosh,

Louis W. Myers died August 29, 1973 and is buried at Freedom Cemetery.

August 1944 to Mrs. Beulah Highfil
Dear Mother,

Just a few lines to let you know I am getting along OK and hope all at home is well.

Mother, do not worry about me too much for the doctors and nurses are all swell and doing all they can for me. I could not be treated any nicer anywhere else.

I do not feel like writing very often while I am still in bed. I have not been able to move my leg yet. It has been crushed but maybe it will not be so many days before I can be up by the use of crutches.

Mother I have received the Purple Heart and will send it home as soon as I get a chance to send it. They have promised to send me back to the states as soon as I am able.

Is Jimmie still in Texas? Tell all hello for me and tell Sis I will write to her as soon as I am up where I can write. All my love, Guy.

Pvt. Robert G. Highfil was seriously wounded in France, July 24, 1944. Highfil died Sept. 30, 2000 and is buried in the Mexico Cemetery.

In March 1944, Sgt. Elba Walker gets good conduct medal. Headquarters European Theatre of Operation, United States Army. Staff Sgt. Elba Walker, was awarded good conduct medal after one

year of meritorious service in the Army. Cpl. Bruce Wheeler gets good conduct medal. The medals are awarded for exemplary behavior, efficiency and fidelity during the soldier's service.

In August 1944, Lt. Virgil P. Woodall was awarded the Silver Star medal. Headquarters, 45th Inf. Div., Lt. Virgil P. Woodall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carden Woodall, Fredonia, has been awarded the Silver Star medal, according to citation of Maj. Gen. W.W. Eagles, commanding the 45th Division.

The citation said "Virgil P. Woodall, first lieutenant, Co. K, Inf. Regt., for gallantry in action May 2, 1944 near Carano, Italy. When the leading platoons of his company were forced to seek cover by intense automatic weapons and mortar fire, Lt. Woodall maneuvered his support platoon to a position from which flanking fire could be delivered. After assuring himself that his men were in position, Lt. Woodall moved across an open field under heavy enemy fire to establish contact with the leading platoons. Although by sniper fire, Lt. Woodall, in spite of his painful wounds, accomplished his mission and returned to his platoon. Lt. Woodall's courage and devotion to duty reflect high credit on the armed forces."

Sept. 1944. Sgt. Loyd Tracy Armstrong has received the Purple Heart with three wound stripes and inscribed on reverse, "For Military Merit." Sergeant Armstrong has been in the South Pacific area, but is now in a hospital location undisclosed recovering from wounds. In addition to the Purple Heart there is a lapel button, crimson center, with white tips on each end. (Loyd Armstrong died Oct. 16, 1968 and is buried in the Love Cemetery.)

Oct. 1944. Washington, Oct. 4th. Capt. Ray Hillyard, Gary, Ind., was reported killed in action in France Sept. 10, by War Department today. No details were released.

Captain Hillyard, 29, was

born in the Tribune section of Crittenden and attended Copperas Springs School and graduated from Marion High School.

He enlisted in Co. I, KNG, and after termination of the enlistment period entered service of the regular Army.

He left the United States in 1942 and for a short period was stationed in Iceland before going to England. He had been in France for the past

several weeks landing there shortly after D-day. He was the son of John and Dora Hilliard.

Dec. 1944. Pvt. J. C. Coleman, son of Lexie Coleman, was wounded in action in Germany Sept. 2. He was hospitalized for a time with hip injuries. He was awarded the Purple Heart on his return from the hospital. He was given a pass to visit Paris

while there. On July 10 he was awarded a Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action against the enemy during the operation on the Cherbourg Peninsula, France. J. C. is now back in action. He has been in combat ever since D-day. He has been overseas since April 10, 1944.

They gave their all, let us remember them not just on Memorial Day, but everyday.

Rockets win 3rd-straight district championship

Behind a dominating two-hitter from eighth-grade starting hurler Travis Gilbert, the Rockets made sure more space would have to be made in the trophy case for their third-straight Fifth District championship, easily dispatching Trigg County 10-0 Tuesday night at Gordon Blue Guess Field.

Gilbert (8-0) seemed to find good things coming in sevens throughout the contest, striking out seven Wildcat hitters and having two different stretches where he retired seven in a row.

After Crittenden (18-13) stranded leadoff hitter J.D. Gray at third in the bottom of the first, it made sure scoring would not be a problem again for the remainder of the contest.

Dylan Clark reached via a hit batsman to start the second and Dyllan Thornton reached to set the table for DH Brian Berry.

Berry, who went 2-for-2 with a walk, gave his squad all the runs it would need, smashing an RBI-single scoring Clark and Thornton for a 2-0 lead. Gray, who went 6-for-8 in the Fifth District Tournament, planted an RBI-single to center field, plating Justin Lee, making it 3-0.

While Gilbert continued to dominate Wildcat hitters, cleanup hitter Alex Porter connected for his fourth homerun of the year in the third, giving his team a comfortable 5-0 lead. Porter finished 5-for-6 with six RBIs in the district tournament.

The victors loaded the bases in the fifth on singles from Porter and Thornton and a bunt by Berry.

Bryce Willis, who was a perfect 3-for-3 in the tournament with a walk, unloaded the bases with a hard hit RBI-double, giving the Rockets an 8-0 advantage.

Casey Oliver eventually ended the game on the 10-run rule with an RBI-single, plating Gray.

Rocket coach Vince Clark, who also won a district championship in 1993 during his first tenure for Crittenden, praised the pitching

performance of Gilbert and another errorless game from his team's defense.

After standing at 5-10 a few weeks ago, the Rockets have managed to put together consistent performances, going an amazing 13-3 since that time.

"It's a reflection of how we prepare in practice," Clark said.

He also praised the defense of senior second baseman Alec Pierce, who made seven putouts in the tournament and has been solid all year in the field.

While outscoring their opposition 28-3 and surrendering only five hits in the tournament, the path to the crown in '93 was not quite as easy.

While blowing archrival Livingston Central out 12-3 in the championship game, they had to survive a close 6-5 encounter in the semifinal round over former league

foe Caldwell County.

The Rockets' seven seniors have played in the Fifth District title games all four years of their high school careers, going 3-1 with their lone setback in 2007 against Trigg County.

"That's a mentality," Clark said about all the success the senior group has enjoyed throughout their careers.

But he has also been pleased with the contributions from four eighth graders, four freshman and four sophomores this spring.

While wanting them to feel happy about their third straight district crown, the Rocket skipper wants them to set their sights on trying to capture the Second Region Tournament crown, which begins next Monday in Hopkinsville.

"We will be challenged next week," he said.

Berry praised Gilbert for taking command from the outset while pitching his two-hit shutout.

"He does what he is called on to do and he does it well. I hope he goes 80-0 in his high school career," Berry said with a chuckle.

The junior was also impressed with the solid tournament performance turned in by sophomore Bryce Willis. Some of Willis' lofty numbers included going a combined 3-for-3 with a walk, five RBIs and four runs scored during the successful tournament.

"He comes in and does his job," said Berry.

Berry, who has been part of a district championship all three years of his high school career, attributes that kind of success to he and his teammates' tremendous work ethic and dedication.

"The last three years everybody has been working their tails off," he said.

An interesting tidbit is that Crittenden and Trigg have met in three of the last four Fifth District Title tilts with the Rockets holding 2-1 record in those match ups.

Boys advance to finals with 18-3 win over Lyon

After a brief hiccup that started with underdog Lyon County jumping out to a 1-0 lead on a lead-off homer to begin the game, the Rockets quickly composed themselves Monday in the opening round of the Fifth District Tournament to easily win 18-3.

In fact, after Rocket starting hurler Joey Pluskota allowed that leadoff homer to his counterpart Cody Guess, he did not allow another Lyon hit until the fifth when they managed a pair of meaningless singles while trailing 18-1.

In the bottom of the first, leadoff

hitter J.D. Gray stretched a hard hit into a double after a Lyon outfielder was slow getting the ball back to the infield. After Pluskota tied the game at one-all on an RBI-single, cleanup hitter Alex Porter, who went a perfect 3-for-3 with three RBIs on the day, made sure it did not stay tied long.

He connected for the first of the Rockets' three RBI-doubles in the first inning and the route began to occur.

Right fielder Dyllan Thornton and DH Bryce Willis added the other two, and the hosts had a 5-1 advantage that the Lyons would never threaten.

Leading by a lopsided 13-1 score, third baseman Brian Berry smashed a three-run home run in the third inning as the Rockets easily made sure they would play in the Fifth District title game for the fourth straight year. They are 2-1 in the previous three, having captured the last two district championships.

Porter, Thornton, Willis and Dylan Clark all had perfect days at the plate, combining for eight of their squad's 17 hits.

Crittenden also played great defense behind Pluskota, playing errorless baseball in the lopsided affair.

Quisenberry's courtesy runner Abby Whitney was batted around, but the other two were stranded on base.

During the third and fourth innings, the Cardinals added seven more earned runs to the scoreboard, solidifying their 12-2 victory.

Crittenden couldn't plate any more runs after the fourth and were mercy ruled after they hit in the fifth inning.

This is the first time the Lady Rockets have won in district tournament play since 1993 and the first time they have advanced to regional postseason play. The regional tournament begins next Monday.

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY ASSESSMENT ROLL

This is the January 1, 2010 assessment on which state, county, school and other districts taxes will be due this fall.

The assessment roll is in the office of the P.V.A. in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 7:30 to 4 p.m. on Fridays and 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. on Saturdays during this period.

Any property owner desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any property owner still aggrieved by an assessment on real property after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The property owner can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the County Clerk's office no later than one working day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any property owner failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by a designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property owners shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a property owner does not agree with the assessed value of personal property.

- 1) Property owner must list under protest (for certification) what they believe to be the fair cash value of their property.
- 2) Personal property owners must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- 3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- 4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

(The Crittenden County PVA Office is responsible for the assessment of property; however we do not set tax rates or collect taxes.)
